

Youth custody population – England and Wales



Youth custody population by offence group – England and Wales



- Proven reoffending rate for juvenile offenders was 32.5% (Oct - Dec 2021 cohort); this is compared to <u>adult offenders</u> whose rate is 25.1% (MoJ stats).




HMIP – What we do

- The UK is a party to the Optional Protocol to the United Nations Convention Against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment (OPCAT).
- HMIP provide independent scrutiny of the conditions for and treatment of prisoners and other detainees and report on our findings.
- We inspect prisons, Young Offender Institutions (YOIs), Secure Training Centres (STCs), Immigration Removal Centres (IRCs), court custody suites and military detention.
- Inspections are carried out against published inspection criteria known as Expectations. The Inspectorate sets its own inspection criteria to ensure transparency and independence.
- Expectations for adult male and female prisons and YOIs are brigaded under the four tests of a 'healthy establishment'.

Children in custody

Young offender institutions (5 x YOIs: Cookham Wood, Feltham, Parc, Werrington, Wetherby)

- Holds children between the ages of 15-18.
- Inspected annually.

Secure training centres (3 x STCs: Medway, Oakhill, Rainsbrook)

- Hold young offenders between the ages of 12-18.
- Inspected annually.
- Ofsted lead these inspections, accompanied by HMI Prisons inspectors.

Secure children's homes

- Run by local authorities or other providers.
- Hold children between the ages of 10-17.
- Can also house those detained for welfare reasons.
- HMI Prisons has no remit to inspect SCHs.



MoJ and HMPPS

- Ministry of Justice (MoJ) is the government department responsible for courts, prisons, probation and attendance centres.
- His Majesty's Prison and Probation Service (HMPPS) is an agency of MoJ and made up of HM Prison Service, Probation Service, Youth Custody Service and a headquarters.

Responsible for:

- running prison and probation services
- o rehabilitation services for people in our care leaving prison
- o making sure support is available to stop people reoffending
- contract managing private sector prisons and services such as:
- o the prisoner escort service
- electronic tagging







How do we inspect children & young people in custody?

- Week 1
 - Includes, but not limited to:
 - Take an initial view of the environment and meet the governor/manager of the establishment
- Detainee survey
 - Survey of a representative proportion of the detainee population key source of evidence, gathering perceptions.
 - Participants chosen at random across all wings/units of the establishment.
 - Confidential and anonymous.
- Staff survey
 - Online staff survey open for 7 days.
- Week 2
 - Lasts five days relevant version of Expectations used for each inspection. Five key sources of evidence for inspection: observation, detainees, staff, relevant third parties, documentation.







Which children end up in custody?- some of our survey findings

Of the children we surveyed in STCs and YOIs in 2022-23:





Of the children we surveyed in STCs and YOIs in 2022-23:

- Just 46% of children reported feeling cared for by staff.
 - Particularly concerning due to the link between good, trusting relationships and effective behaviour management.
- 32% of children did not have a member of staff they felt they could turn to for help if they had a problem.
- **55%** of children thought their experiences of custody made them less likely to offend in the future.



- High levels of violence, use of weapons.

- Use of 'keep aparts' and poor behaviour management approaches e.g.
 <u>Cookham Wood</u>: 90% of boys were being kept apart from other prisoners, with nearly 600 keep apart instructions. Lack of meaningful incentives across YOIs.
- Limited regime and levels of purposeful activity, made worse by use of 'keep aparts'.
- PAVA incapacitant spray.



Key concerns in the youth estate

- Despite significant resources, most sites are unable to deliver one meaningful conversation with each child a week – as a result many children do not feel cared for.
- Many children are placed too far from home e.g. 37% of children were placed 50 or more miles from their home in 2022-23 (MoJ stats).
 - o This situation is particularly acute for girls.
- Demographics of youth custody population.
 - Black children 26%.
 - o 5 girls, 563 boys includes 18+ in youth custody (MoJ stats).



- YCS have the highest sickness absence rate at 18.2 average working days lost in the 12 months ending Sep 2023 (compared with 11.5 for all HMPPS staff).

Cookham Wood:

Out of 148 operational posts, only 65 staff were able to be deployed.

Despite 360 staff in post, (including 44 managers) for 77 children, outcomes were still incredibly poor.




Cookham Wood inspection – April 2023

- Complete breakdown of behaviour management, with widespread weapon use.
- 90% of children were subjected to 'keep aparts' and staff were managing 583 individual conflicts in a population of 77.
- Over a quarter of the population was completely segregated from the main population two boys had been subject to these conditions for 100 days.
- Acceptance of low standards e.g. uniform.
- Education, skills and work provision was inadequate.
 - o Allocations were based on 'keep apart' lists.










Parc – a more positive story

- Positive inspection in 2022 <u>Report</u> on an unannounced inspection of <u>HMYOI Parc by HM Chief Inspector</u> of Prisons 28 March - 8 April 2022 (justiceinspectorates.gov.uk)
- Strong relationships between children and staff that resulted in largely positive outcomes for children.
- Very supportive culture.
- Excellent enrichment programme.
- Good amount of time out of cell.
