It is with deepest appreciation that I accept this honor to speak on behalf of our
participants who have completed a very fruitful training programme at UNAFEI.

First of all, let me extend our gratitude and sincere thanks to the Government of Japan, its people, JICA and UNAFEI for giving us this golden opportunity to represent our respective countries at the 13th Training Course on 'The Criminal Justice Response to Corruption'. I would be failing in my duty if I do not pay gratitude to the Asia Crime Prevention Foundation (ACPF) for their hospitality in hosting us a special dinner.
