LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

It is my privilege to inform readers of the successful completion of the 190th International Training Course on Countering Cybercrime and Crimes involving Misuse of Cryptoassets which took place in Tokyo from 22 May to 17 June 2026. In this Course, we welcomed 5 Japanese participants and 18 overseas participants: 5 from Africa, 10 from Asia, 2 from Oceania, and 1 from South America. The participants included criminal investigators, prosecutors and other criminal justice officials. As this newsletter demonstrates, the Course was extremely productive. It comprised lectures delivered by visiting experts, guest lecturers, and UNAFEI faculty members, as well as study visits, individual presentations, and interactive discussion sessions.

Across the world, cybercrime continues to increase in frequency, scope and severity, and cybercriminals have become adept at using jurisdictional borders to delay and disrupt criminal investigations. All too often this results in impunity for cybercriminals, massive profits for organized criminal groups and devastating financial and emotional harm to the victims. To crack these cases and recover the assets, criminal investigators need to respond quickly and decisively to preserve data, freeze criminal proceeds and seek assistance from criminal investigators in other jurisdictions. Accordingly, criminal investigators, including first responders, require greater technical knowledge of computer systems, basic digital forensics and cryptocurrency, as well as an understanding of the role of international cooperation in combating cybercrime.

UNAFEI, as one of the institutes of the United Nations Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice Programme Network, held this Course to offer participants an opportunity to clarify and analyse the current situation of cybercrime and cybercrime investigation in each participating country and to explore more effective practices. Additionally, the participants were able to share experiences, gain knowledge and build a human network of counterparts.

During the Course, the participants diligently and comprehensively examined the main theme, primarily through a comparative analysis. The participants shared their own experiences and knowledge of the issues and identified problems and areas in which improvements could be made. With the academic and practical input from the visiting experts, expert lecturers and UNAFEI faculty – and the in-depth discussions they had with each other – the participants are now better equipped to enhance the policies and practices related to cybercrime and cybercrime investigation.

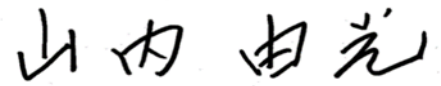

THE 190TH INTERNATIONAL TRAINING COURSE

COUNTERING CYBERCRIME AND CRIMES INVOLVING MISUSE OF CRYPTOASSETS

Course Rationale

I. INTRODUCTION

In recent years, cybercrime and crimes involving the misuse of cryptoassets have intensified across national borders. For example, in East and Southeast Asian countries including Japan, fraud conducted through social media has become a serious problem. Such cases are typically carried out on a transnational and large-scale basis by organized fraud groups operating across the regions. ICT-enabled crime has become diverse and sophisticated, including illegal access, the distribution of ransomware, and the trafficking of illicit drugs and child sexual abuse or child sexual exploitation material on the dark web.

In the commission of these cyber-enabled crimes, cryptoassets are used as a means to transfer, conceal and launder criminal proceeds. While cryptoassets themselves are legitimate technology, their characteristics, such as anonymity, speed and cross-border operability, create risks of misuse for a wide range of crimes, including fraud, money-laundering, terrorist financing and human trafficking.

To combat cybercrime, international legal frameworks have been developed. The Convention on Cybercrime, adopted by the Council of Europe in 2001 (the Budapest Convention),¹ was the first comprehensive international treaty on cybercrime, and it has since been ratified by 81 countries worldwide. It has provided a platform to strengthen domestic legal frameworks on electronic evidence and mutual legal assistance in criminal matters.

Following subsequent discussions at the United Nations, the UN General Assembly in 2019 decided to elaborate a new cybercrime convention (A/RES/74/247), and in December 2025 the United Nations Convention against Cybercrime² was adopted by the General Assembly (A/RES/79/243). The UN Cybercrime Convention is intended to serve as a universal framework designed for the diverse membership of the United Nations. Both conventions provide for the criminalization of cyber-related offences, the establishment of procedural measures and powers, and frameworks for international cooperation.

Law enforcement agencies, prosecutorial authorities and courts dealing with cybercrime and crimes involving the misuse of cryptoassets require highly specialized knowledge and technical skills. Digital forensic technologies, in particular those for tracing cryptoassets, have advanced significantly and are increasingly used by investigative and prosecutorial authorities.

However, in many countries, further efforts are needed to strengthen legal and institutional frameworks, technical infrastructure and the capacity of criminal justice practitioners. Moreover, offenders, victims, evidence, and criminal proceeds of cybercrime and crimes involving cryptoassets are often located across multiple jurisdictions. As a result, investigations, prosecutions and asset recovery conducted by a single country are mostly ineffective. Effective responses, therefore, require not only enhanced capacities of criminal justice authorities in each country, but also the promotion of mutual understanding, the sharing of best practices and strengthened international cooperation.

Against this background, this training programme aimed to provide a forum for sharing experiences and challenges in addressing cybercrime and crimes involving the misuse of cryptoassets, as well as for exchanging practical knowledge on effective investigation and prosecution, international cooperation and preventive measures. By strengthening the capacities of practitioners in each country, this programme sought to contribute to the rule of law and to a safe and sustainable society.

This programme promoted understanding of relevant international legal frameworks, including the newly adopted United Nations Cybercrime Convention and the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime. It also included case exercises, the sharing of good practices in digital forensics and practical lectures on the functioning and tracing of cryptoassets and their application in criminal investigations.

II. KEY TOPICS

- (1) The current situation regarding cybercrime and crimes involving the misuse of cryptoassets in each country.
- (2) Issues and challenges in the detection, investigation, prosecution and adjudication of cybercrime and crimes involving the misuse of cryptoassets.
- (3) Best practices in each country in the detection, investigation, prosecution and adjudication of cybercrime and crimes involving the misuse of cryptoassets, including, for example:
 - effective measures in identifying, preserving, collecting, analysing and utilizing electronic evidence;
 - cooperation and coordination between investigative agencies and digital forensic laboratories;
 - development of the necessary knowledge and skills of investigators, prosecutors and judges.
- (4) International cooperation in combating cybercrime and crimes involving the misuse of cryptoassets.

Course Summary

Lectures

During the Course, the participants attended a variety of lectures, presentations and discussion sessions, including 3 presented by visiting experts, 6 by expert lecturers and lectures by faculty members of UNAFEI. The distinguished lecturers addressed issues relating to the main theme of the Course and contributed significantly beyond their lectures by answering the participants' questions during the question-and-answer sessions. The visiting experts were from INTERPOL, EUROPOL and the UNODC. The expert lectures from Japan included lecturers from the National Police Agency, the Japan Prosecutors Unit on Emerging Crimes (JPEC), a private law firm, and a blockchain intelligence company. The lecturers and lecture topics are listed on pages 6 and 7.

Individual Presentations

Toward the beginning of the Course, all participants delivered individual presentations which introduced the situation, problems and future prospects of the participants' countries. These papers were distributed to all the participants. Each presentation was followed by a Q&A session, in which additional information was shared. See "Individual Presentations" for more information. The Individual Presentation topics are listed on pages 8 to 10.

Group Workshop Sessions

Group workshop sessions provided the participants with the opportunity to further examine the sub-topics of the main theme through in-depth discussions. In order to conduct each session effectively, the UNAFEI faculty selected individuals to serve as group members for the sub-topics. Selected participants served as chairpersons, or rapporteurs, and faculty members served as advisers. Each group's primary responsibility was to explore and develop their chosen topics in the group workshop sessions. The participants and UNAFEI faculty studied the topics and exchanged their views based on information obtained through personal experience, the individual presentations, lectures and so forth. INFORMATION ABOUT FORTHCOMING PROGRAMMES

1. The 191st International Training Course

From 26 August to 17 September 2026, UNAFEI will host the 191st International Training Course in Tokyo, Japan. The main theme of the Course is “Implementation of correctional programmes tailored to the specific needs of socially vulnerable groups, such as women, children, youth, and people with disabilities”. Approximately 19 participants from overseas and Japan will attend.

2. The 28th UNAFEI UNCAC Training Programme

UNAFEI’s annual anti-corruption programme, the UNAFEI UNCAC Training Programme, will take place from 22 October to 17 November 2026. The main theme of the Programme is “Initiatives and institutional frameworks for ensuring effective corruption prevention and facilitating subsequent investigation”. Approximately 22 participants from overseas and Japan will attend.
